

- The Humanitarian Division adjudicates Forms I-918, I-601, I-212, Temporary Protected Status (TPS), and I-360 Special immigrant visa (SIV).



The Purpose of the U Visa

Form I-918

U nonimmigrant status (U visa):

- Provides immigration benefits to victims of certain crimes.
- Strengthens law enforcement's ability to investigate and prosecute human trafficking and certain other crimes.
- Encourages trafficked, exploited, and abused victims to report crimes, even if they don't have lawful immigration status.



Immigration relief is available for victims of human trafficking, domestic violence and other crimes

Basic U Visa Requirements

- Victim of qualifying criminal activity
 - Crime must have occurred in U.S. or violated U.S. law
- Victim has credible and reliable information about the qualifying crime
- Victim generally must have been, is being, or is likely to be helpful to law enforcement in the investigation or prosecution of the qualifying crime
- Victim suffered substantial physical or mental abuse as a result of qualifying crime

- Includes attempt to commit, conspiracy to commit, or solicitation to commit any crime on statutory list
- Substantially similar crimes may also qualify
- USCIS decides if a crime listed on the law enforcement certification is a "qualifying" crime




Applicants use Form I-918, Petition for U Nonimmigrant Status, to apply.

The U visa:

- Grants temporary status for up to 4 years (with the possibility for a Green Card)
- Allows temporary status for certain family members
- Provides a work permit

There is an annual cap of 10,000 visas that USCIS may issue per fiscal year.

Form I-601,
Application for
Waiver of
Grounds of
Inadmissibility

Applicants must file this form to seek a waiver of certain grounds of inadmissibility if they:


- Are inadmissible to the United States, and
- Are applying for an immigrant visa, adjustment of status, or certain other immigration benefits.

- Applicant goes to the consular interview at an overseas office.
- After the consular officer determines that the applicant is inadmissible and that a waiver is available, the applicant will file Form I-601 at the Phoenix Lockbox.
- The lockbox will route the file to the NSC.
- The NSC will process the Form I-601 and notify the Department of State electronically of its decision.









The applicant must:

- Sign the application. A copy of the applicant's signature can be accepted.
- Sign the Form G-28 (if applicable). A copy of the applicant's signature is not acceptable.



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The applicant must:

- Include documentary evidence to support statement.
- Provide a U.S. mailing address in Part 1, if possible.
